

Mr. Tavel was presented to the living at Campsea Ashe in 1817, by Sir Ralph James Woodford, Bait. He then vacated the vicarage of Kellington. In 1818, he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society; and in 1828, he was presented by his brother-in-law, the Duke of Grafton, to the rectory of Euston, Suffolk¹.

A number of his sermons were recorded sermons, although no copies have yet been found. These include:

Christian Faith illustrated by the faith of Abraham. A visitation sermon on Gen. xv. 6 (1824)

(Apparently preached at Wickham Market at the annual visitation of the Rev and Ven Henry Denny Berners, LL.B., Archdeacon of Suffolk).

Responsibility of the Clergy in regard to Doctrine. A visitation sermon on 2 Pet. iii. 1820

(A Sermon Preached in the Church at Woodbridge on Saturday, May 27, 1820, at the Septennial Visitation of the Right Rev. Father in God Henry, Lord Bishop of Norwich)

Taken from *The Literary Panorama* July 1811:

The Rev. George Frederick Tavel, M. A. resigned the office of Senior Tutor of Trinity college on Michaelmas day. The honourable manner in which he has fulfilled the duties of that important situation, has induced the members of that society, to enter into a subscription (at the head of which is the illustrious Chancellor of the university) for the purpose of presenting him with a piece of plate as a testimony of their respect and esteem. He is succeeded in the office of Tutor by the Rev. Thomas Young, M. A.

CodiciL February 13th 1823 I wish to leave to my servant Joseph a certain sum of Ten thousand quincas George Frederic Cavel

Memorandum The two inscriptions in the said funds purchased in my name viz 4002 francs & 4857 francs were made for my dear Cousin Mrs Elizabeth Sulzer & belong to her & is a 3rd inscription in the same funds of 480 francs which is my own property & the two inscriptions are all of them in the name of my dear Cousin Mrs Paul de Bourne now resident in Paris.

In the Jurisdiction Court of Canterbury

In the Goods of the Reverend George Frederic Cavel (wh. dec'd) Appeared Personally The Right Honorable William Fitz Roy commonly called Lord William Fitz Roy of Great

Britain and Baron in the County of Middlesex and John Kirkwood Esquire and made oath that they knew and were well acquainted with the Reverend George Frederic Cavel formerly of Trinity College Cambridge but late Rector of Campsey Hall in the County of Suffolk Clerk of the Peace for a considerable time prior to his death and appeared as they have been examined and believe on the twenty seventh day of April last and that during their knowledge of the deceased they have often seen written and subscribed his name to writings and have thereby come to know and be well acquainted with his manner and character of his handwriting and subscription and having now with care and attention viewed and perused the paper writing aforesaid purporting to be and contain the last will and Testament with two Codicils thereto of the said deceased the said will beginning thus "I the Rev George Frederic Cavel giving this 23rd day of May 1816" and thus subscribed as George Frederic Cavel the first Codicil being in the words and contents following "Codicil February 13th 1823 I wish to leave to my servant Joseph a certain sum of Ten thousand quincas" and thus subscribed "George Frederic Cavel" & the second Codicil beginning thus
