Thirty children of primary age attend this small school which serves an isolated village with a

population of about 350.

Built about 1866 the premises are dark and inconvenient, situated on a small roadside site, well below the road level - an unsurfaced sandy hollow of which the only attraction to the passerby is a picturesque fringe of conifers which in fact serves but to darken the rooms. Water is drawn from the School House pump and although electricity is supplied to the house it has not been installed in the school.

The Headmistress took charge four years ago after a one-year period of training and six months' service in the County. Both hard and hardworking she deserves generous praise for the progress that has been made. Her efforts to enlist the full co-operation of the children and their parents have met with success and in the life of the School there is now much to commend.

The fifteen infants occupy the larger of the two rooms - 18 ft x 37 ft and for the past fifteen months they have

been under the kindly care of an assistant, without experience of infant work, who will be leaving the profession at the end of the year. The educational possibilities of this comparatively spacious room have not yet been fully developed but this may be due in part to the frequent room interchange between the two classes for varied activities and indoor Physical Education. A pleasant introduction to school life is provided, the most promising feature being the language training. The children are friendly and natural.

The fifteen juniors occupy the smaller room - 16 ft x 21 ft - a cramped space sadly deficient in storage accommodation. The children are industrious and well disposed and there is always an air of happy absorption here that is wholly admirable. They are used to carrying responsibility and are well behaved and self controlled.

Recently the language training has progressed convincingly and the older children talk easily and well. The written

work is sensibly planned but more frequent outlet for personal expression would be of benefit. The children have produced their own 'newspaper' and some valuable composite books of local studies have been compiled. Dramatic work has distinctive features. A certain amount of incidental basic drill is taken in spelling and also in arithmetic. The children approach mechanical book work with confidence and their written work in arithmetic, always neat and painstaking, reveals sound teaching on individual lines. Reading material is well chosen and carefully graded and the majority of the children read with fluency and pleasure. Frequent silent reading, followed by systematic individual narration, is a valuable practice and the library is well used. Work in art is full of life and interest and a varied range of craftwork is developed; the inclusion of more three-dimensional exercises is contemplated.

There being no musical strength

on the staff broadcast lessons in Music are welcomed. Nature broadcasts provide a useful supplement to the Study of living things; there are well stocked aquaria and an attractive display table, and the children keep charts of their own seasonal observations. Raambles are taken and cycle visits to neighbouring bigger schools have been made to see locally produced films on bird life. Physical Education provides lively pleasure and the dancing lessons yield obvious delight. The prescribed Diocesan Syllabus is used for Religious Instruction and the simple daily opening service is a reverent and seemly act of worship. The broadcast religious service is closely followed and enjoyed. The parents are interested in the life of the School and are fully co-operative. A recent jumble sale produced £17. The managers readily lend every support and encouragement - news are conveyed from the Taunton Startet Area School and about two thirds of the children stay to dinner; half a dozen children bring a packed lunch.

The afternoon ended with tea, lemonade

and biscuits in the field.
